## Honors Points System Overview

Fall 2020

This document is an introduction to the Honors points system and an outline of the categories and the type of activities that will go toward point accumulation. Full details are in the Honors Student Handbook. The charts below summarize the requirements to graduate with University Honors and lists the options for students to earn the needed 20 Honors points. Evaluate these options to begin preparing your strategy to earn your 20 Honors points.

Each student meets individually with a faculty advisor and the Honors Director to create a personalized plan for accumulating Honors points. Study abroad and Scholarship category options particularly require early planning, as optimization of points here will take work as early as your freshman year.

| Honors Points: Suggested Earning Guidelines | 1. Freshmen: 6 in first year, $4-5$ in each subsequent year <br> 2. Sophs/Juniors: 2-4 first year, 5-7 in each subsequent year |
| Minimum GPA requirement for each term | 1.3.25 GPA for first three semesters <br> 2. 3.35 by end of second year <br> 3. Should reach 3.5 by third year <br> 4. Students put on probation for one semester if not meeting the minimum requirements; must meet target GPA by end of probationary semester or make significant progress to stay in program |
| General Process and Procedure | 1. Forms are available on Blackboard to submit point requests through the assignment function. <br> 2. The Grading Center will track accumulated points. <br> 3. Students must submit requests for points by the announced date of each semester term. |

## Scholarship Category

| Minimum Number Points Required | 1 point |
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| Ways to earn Scholarship points | 1. Summer research program <br> 2. Project with faculty mentor <br> 3. Presentation of creative work or research results <br> 4. Publication of work |
| Summer Research Programs | Examples: <br> 1. Welch Chemistry Program (1 pt) <br> 2. Research Experience for Undergraduates ( $10-\mathrm{wk}$ REU) (2 pts) |
| Research work | 1. Thesis (current honors project) <br> 2. Faculty-led project over 2 semester minimum; requires abstract (proposal) before starting and summary paper for honors points <br> 3. Capstone project; requires abstract and summary paper |
| Creative work | 1. Thesis <br> 2. Faculty-led project over 2 semester minimum; requires abstract (proposal) before starting and summary paper for honors points <br> 3. Capstone project; requires abstract and summary paper <br> 4. Exhibition, production or performance |
| Podium and Poster Presentations | 1. Juried conferences (2 pts) <br> 2. Conference of professional or academic organization (2 pts) <br> 3. UIW Research Week (1 pt) <br> 4. Honors Symposium (1 pt) |
| Publication | 1. Refereed professional or undergraduate journal (2 pts) <br> 2. Conference Proceedings (1 pt) <br> 3. Submission to refereed professional Journal (1 pt) <br> 4. In-house publications (1 pt) <br> 5. Book review published in refereed publication (1 pt) |

## Self-Development Category

| Minimum Point Requirements | 2 points |
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| Ways to Earn Self-Development Points | 1. Leadership <br> 2. Service <br> 3. Study Abroad <br> 4. Integrative Reflection Paper <br> 5. Internship of at least 100 hours |
| Internships | 1. $100+$ hours earns 1 point <br> 2. $200+$ hours earns 2 points |
| Leadership Options | 1. Officer in organization over two semesters; requires list of year's goals at beginning of year and substantiation of contributions by advisor (2 pts) <br> 2. Completion of documented leadership program under the direction of a UIW approved program (1 pt) <br> 3. All options require a resume of student accomplishments during service |
| Service Options | 1. 75 hours of service ( 1 pt ) <br> 2. 90 hours of service ( 2 pts ) <br> 3. Development of sustainable program in line with UIW mission (2 pts) <br> 4. Requires reflection paper |
| Study Abroad | 1. Fall, spring, summer semester ( 2 pts ) <br> 2. Experience < full semester (1 pt) <br> 3. Trip associated with course (1 pt) <br> 4. Requires reflection paper <br> 5. Presentation of int'l experience through the Study Abroad Office (1 pt) |
| Integrative Reflection Paper | 1. Synthesizes information gained and lessons learned throughout student's self-development process (2 pts) <br> 2. Experiences would include such things as internships, research, service, academic growth, exposure to new/different experiences |
