PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The program in Art balances studies in the liberal arts and sciences with studio art and art history. Focal areas include a B.A in Studio Art, a B.F.A. in Studio Art with a concentration, a B.F.A. in Photography, a minor in Art, a Minor in Art History, and a minor in Art Therapy. Courses in art history, design, drawing, painting, printmaking, sculpture and ceramics are designed to develop personal awareness and individual self-expression. The goal of the program is to impart an informed understanding of art through creative work and discerning observation, as well as prepare the student for entry into an M.F.A, program and/or for participation in the professional art world.

QUICK FACTS

There are many career options to students majoring in Art. Among them are teaching at the primary or secondary level as well as on a college/university level. Artists also teach through alternative community arts programs and museum educational programs. They work in the non-profit sector as curators and arts administrators. Jobs are available through city art programs, which need coordinators and staff for both after-school and public art programs. These positions rise to the highest level, with artists working at the National Endowment for the Arts and other foundations. Artists can also work as grant writers for museums and non-profit organizations. They serve as staff members for local, state, regional, and national arts funders, including the San Antonio Office of Cultural Affairs, the Texas Commission on the Arts, and many others. Visual artists are gallery owners or work for art galleries as directors and preparators. Artists can work for art magazines as critics/arts writers and editors. An artist who chooses to pursue a full-time studio career can make a livelihood through private and public art commissions. Majors in Art also work as professional photographers and commercial artists. Several of our photographers have become successful commercial and portrait photographers.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

The requirements for admission to the B.A. and B.F.A. programs in Art are the same as the requirements for admission to the University of the Incarnate Word.
