WE HAVE A NEW NAME!!!

After many years of extending our offerings to include eight languages in addition to Spanish, and of having our students participate in study abroad programs in various countries and languages, the faculty of the Department of Foreign Languages realized that we were teaching our students to have a more multicultural view of the world. We were also aware that for many of our Hispanic heritage students, Spanish was a second, if not a first, language – alive and well in borderland South Texas. In order to reflect these realities and to avoid the us-them implications of the term "foreign," we chose the more inclusive "Modern Languages" as a new name for the department. The change became official in April of 2009.

FACULTY ACTIVITIES

Dr. Amalia Mondríguez is back from her sabbatical. During that time she completed the second part of the Spanish for Pharmacists book. Some of her poems were included in *Quirk*, a UIW publication. She will attend the Conference of the Society of Children's Book Writers and Illustrators in August. This year she won a SCBWI free tuition for the 2009 conference. Dr. Mondríguez is an assistant to Heather Power, president of the San Antonio chapter.

Dr. Sally Said had a chapter published in a book: "From Oral Tradition to Legal Documents: Words to Protect the Headwaters of the San Antonio River." *Sustainability: Rhetorics, Literacies and Narratives.* Ed. Peter Goggin. London: Routledge/Taylor & Francis, 2009. In summer 2008, Dr. Said spent six weeks at Diné College in Tsaile Arizona, studying the Navajo language and assisting with a Navajo Linguistics course. She also presented a paper, "Between Worlds: Navajo Culture as a Bridge from Orality to Literacy,"

at the Western States Rhetoric and Literacy Conference on Cultural Rhetorics, Montana State University, Bozeman, October 24, 2008. In Spring 2009, Dr. Said was promoted to full professor.

Dr. Michael Tallon attended the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL) 2008 Conference in Orlando, Florida, where he presented "Foreign Language Anxiety and Heritage Students of Spanish: A Qualitative Study." At the conference he was elected the Treasurer for the Spanish for Native Speakers (SNS) Special Interest Group (SIG). His paper "A Culture of Caring: Reducing Anxiety and Increasing Engagement in First-Year Foreign Language Courses" was published in the conference proceedings from the UIW/NVC Title V Symposium – Collaborating for Student Success: Building Engagement in Learning. His paper "Foreign Language Anxiety and Heritage Students of Spanish: A Quantitative Study" was recently published in the Spring 2009 issue of *Foreign Language Annals*, the official journal of the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages. He continues to serve as the Editor in Chief, as well as on the Editorial and Review Committee, of *Texas Papers in Foreign Language Education*. His biography was published in *Who's Who in America, 2009*.

IN MEMORIAM – DR. MARIO SANTIZO

It is with great sadness that we announce that Dr. Mario Santizo, adjunct instructor of Spanish, passed away on Monday, December 1, 2008. Dr. Santizo was born on November 9, 1938, in Pochuta, Guatemala. After receiving his Ph.D. in Spanish Literature at St. Louis University, he taught Spanish at the University of Iowa for 29 years. In 1999, he and his wife Minita moved to San Antonio and Dr. Santizo began teaching Spanish at UIW. Dr. Santizo was very popular with the students and he will be greatly missed.
