In-Service for Spanish Instructors

On Saturday, August 22, 2009, the Spanish teachers of the Department of Modern Languages met for an inservice one-day workshop with Lisa Volle, World Language Consultant with Heinle-Cengage, to go over the Spanish textbook *Nexos*. Ms. Volle provided an overview of the textbook, including scope and sequence and communicative goals of the curriculum. She included specific online enrichment resources provided to the instructors for class use with grammar tutorial videos, podcasts, and Google Earth. The full-time and adjunct professors were lead in a "best practices" discussion for projects and speaking activities.

DID YOU KNOW?

A comprehensive study published in Fall 2009 by the European Commission, entitled *The Contribution of Multilingualism to Creativity*, reveals evidence that learning a second language brings benefits that go beyond using the language itself. The study notes six major benefits of language learning: enhanced learning capacity, enhanced mental flexibility, enhanced problem-solving capability, enhanced interpersonal ability, expanded metalinguistic ability, and reduced age-related mental diminishment.

According to a new study by Raphiq Ibrahim, Mark Leikin, Zohar Eviatar, and Shimon Sapir, published in the *Journal of Psycholinguistic Research*, adult learners perceive second language speech to be easier when it is spoken in the accent of the listener and not in the original accent of that language. The researchers concluded that their research "lays emphasis on the importance of continuing investigation into the cognitive perspectives of accent in order to gain a better understanding of how we learn languages other than our native tongue." The Spanish majors and **Dr. Amalia Mondríguez** attended a ceremony in honor of **Dr. Carmen Tafolla**, who received the Tomás Rivera Award for best Mexican American book for children, 2010. They also attended the Texas Librarian Conference at the end of April.

Also in April, the Spanish majors served as volunteers (interpreters, etc.) at the Health Fair held at the Convocation Center. The event was sponsored by Univisión and the Feik School of Pharmacy.

Roxanna Montes-Bazaldúa, who studied Spanish at UIW, was awarded the Trinity Prize for Excellence in Teaching, an honor given each year by Trinity University to outstanding teachers in the San Antonio area. Roxanna graduated from UIW in 1998 with a Bachelor's degree in Spanish and earned a Master's degree in Education in 2001, also from UIW. She is currently working on a doctoral degree at UIW in International Education/Entrepreneurship. In 2008 Roxanna published *The Legend of the Cascarón*, which started as a class project in one of Dr. Amalia Mondríguez's advanced Spanish classes at UIW.

FACULTY ACTIVITIES

Dr. Amalia Mondríguez wrote a basic Spanish booklet for the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word and taught basic Spanish to them in the Spring (12 students) and the summer (10 students). Dr. Mondríguez was the 2010 recipient of the Sr. Margaret Rose Palmer Mission Award for Education at UIW. The "Mission Continues Faculty Awards Program" is a series of five annual awards named for Sisters who represent the congregational heritage of living the Mission through teaching, scholarship, and community service. The awards recognize faculty for their commitment to promoting the Mission and supporting the ministry of UIW in an outstanding manner. Dr. Mondríguez recently attended the summer conference of the Society of Children's Book Writers and Illustrators (SCBWI) in Los Angeles, California, and is now an officer of the SCBWI. During the past year the Spanish program at UIW sponsored SCBWI presentations on creative writing and held critique groups. Dr. Mondríguez also prepared the test for the Spanish certification for pharmacists.

At Diné College, Tsaile, AZ, **Dr. Sally Said** audited a Navajo language course, June 2009, assisting the instructor with teaching methods appropriate to heritage speakers. She also attended the Western States Rhetoric and Literacy Conference on Social Justice, University of Utah, Salt Lake City, October 22-24, where she presented her paper, "Latino Students Writing in Spanish: Autobiographical Narrative as Social Justice." In spring 2010, while on sabbatical, she continued research on Navajo language and the influence of Spanish, traveling to the Navajo Nation for the first summer session at Diné College. She also chairs the dissertation committee of Allison Baez, who is researching a Navajo cultural topic. On Earth Day, April 22, UIW's Earth Month Committee presented the William Mulcahy Award for Ecological Stewardship to Dr. Said for her work with the Headwaters Coalition and earlier groups dedicated to ecological conservation. Additionally, Dr. Said has served on the First Year Engagement Taskforce and as an evaluator of McNair presentations. She wrote "University of the Incarnate Word and the Arts of Liberation" for an essay-writing activity in CHASS, and the essay was awarded first place, Fall 2009. She also served as a member of the NEH Water Grant faculty group, assisting in planning schedules for speakers presenting on topics related to water law and conservation in Texas and Mexico.

Dr. Michael Tallon attended the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL) 2009 Conference in San Diego, California, where he presented "The Effects of Computer-Mediated Communication on Foreign Language Anxiety in Heritage and Non-Heritage Students of Spanish: A Preliminary Investigation." This paper was published in the Fall/Winter 2009 issue of *Texas Papers in Foreign Language Education*. In addition, he co-authored (along with Dr. Elaine K. Horwitz and Han Luo) a chapter on Foreign Language Anxiety in *Academic Anxieties*. He continues to serve as the Treasurer for the Spanish for Native Speakers (SNS) Special Interest Group (SIG) of ACTFL. He was recently promoted to Associate Professor and is now the Chair of the Department of Modern Languages.
