EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability had an exciting year filled with a new organizational structure that allowed for community engagement (campus, local, & global) goals to be achieved and new programs to be developed, such as the implementation of over 150 programs and activities impacting over 38,400 community members. The core values of faith, truth, education, service, & innovation continue to be the platform that fosters service learning opportunities to include community collaborations at all levels for those the Center serves.

At the local level, the University's Academic Deans, faculty, and students have engaged in a collaborative relationship with several K-12 educational partners, such as Southwest Independent School District, in an effort to continue building and expanding the educational pipeline from pre-kinder through professional degree programs. At the national level, we are engaged in a mentorship program in collaboration with the National Hispanic Medical Association, focusing on increasing the participation and matriculation rates of Latina/o students in health professional school programs throughout the Southwest and Nation. Moreover, we are building partnerships with other institutions of higher learning such as Kent State and Carroll College in an effort to afford our students additional opportunities to learn of issues in communities other than Central/South Texas. Internationally, we continue to support and facilitate missions in alignment with Catholic Social Teaching and demonstrate the institution's "Mission in Action" via our work in San Antonio, South Texas, Mexico, Peru, Guatemala, and Brazil.

The Cardinal Community Leaders Program will begin its fifth year in existence and continues to be a model of excellence which develops civic leaders who are aware of social justice issues and engage in service projects that continue to impact our local & regional communities. This year we had several of our Cardinal Community Leaders students complete their undergraduate degree programs and will be transitioning to graduate school, health professional schools and career fields as a professional. Many of the students have individually noted that their experience at UIW and as part of the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability has had a "transforming impact on their commitment to their community, and their individual growth for today and in the future."

The Center has also been engaged in promoting internship programs to support the academic and professional needs of our outstanding students at the University of Chicago HSI/HBCU Bridge College Scholarship Program, the HACU-DC Internship Program, the WISH DC Internship Program, and the Incarnate Word Foundation Internship Program. Through these activities students are able to continue their education to gain experiences and learn about the operations of our federal government, graduate school opportunities and to develop innovative projects which serve the needs of other people through the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word (CCVI) ministries.

The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability prides itself to be ready and prepared to answer the call to serve in a moments notice. For example, due to numerous natural disasters impacting thousands, the Ettling Center was asked to lead joint efforts in supporting relief efforts of the institution for those that were directly impacted by Hurricanes Harvey, Irma, and Maria and the deadly earthquakes and tremors in Southern Mexico. This is yet another example of the institution's commitment to the "Mission in Action."


Through the leadership of our faculty liaison, Dr. Martha Ann Kirk (CCVI), we participated in supporting the city of San Antonio's 300th anniversary celebration. Students, staff, and faculty at Incarnate Word engaged in the "Mi Casa es Su Casa" event that brought over 750 people to visit the campus and learn of the role the institution and the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word (CCVI) have played in the growth and expansion of the City of San Antonio since 1718. This year the director of the Ettling Center, Dr. Ricardo Gonzalez, worked closely with the Office of Sustainability to support and assist student and faculty involvement in sustainability efforts such as the Cardinal Technology Recycle Program, Cardinal Move Out, the Cardinal Community Garden, EcoExchangeEdu and the HACU EcoAmerica grant. These opportunities allowed for not only service but scholarship among faculty and students. The academic year culminated with the completion of the initial phase of an analysis of student service reflections being conducted by Drs. Susan Hall and Sandra Guzman-Foster. Their research project will assist the Center better understand the needs of our students and their understanding of the charism of the institution.

In closing, the Center is blessed to have the opportunity to play an integral role in the transformation of our students, support the needs of our faculty, and impact the global communities we serve. We look forward to the 2018-2019 academic year in which we plan to celebrate the five year anniversary of the vision of Sr. Dot with the inception of the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability by continuing to meet the core values of the mission of the University of Incarnate Word and the vision of President Evans.

MISSION & VISION







Student Engagement Program Summary

Cardinal Community Leaders Program (CCL)

The Ettling Center coordinates the Cardinal Community Leaders (CCL) program, a model program that encourages students to develop civic leadership competencies and increase awareness of social justice issues from extended service experiences both locally and globally. As a collective group, the CCL's conducted over 2,500 hours of community service impacting over 4,000 children, adults and senior citizens during the 2017-2018 academic year.

NHMA College Health Scholars Program


The Center hosted the first NHMA College Health Scholars Program in April of 2018. The purpose of this program in coordination with the National Hispanic Medical Association is to increase awareness, participation, and matriculation of Latina/o students to health professional school programs throughout the United States. The San Antonio Regional Program coordinated by the Ettling Center was one of three programs throughout the nation (Los Angeles & Washington DC). The event was attended by 83 students which exceeded the goal of 50. The initial cohort of attendees included 56 college students and 27 high school students, representing 3 colleges and 11 high schools.

Civility Week

The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability in collaboration with Student Life have hosted and promoted programmatic events for Civility Week over the past three years. Programs and events are conducted to celebrate the institution's commitment in supporting a community of persons of diverse backgrounds, in the belief that mutual respect and interaction advances the discovery of truth, mutual understanding, self-realization, and the common good. This year, roughly 456 students participated in programs conducted during this three-day long celebration.

Voter Registration Initiative

The Ettling Center in collaboration with UIW student organizations, Student Engagement, and the local non-profit MoveOnSA.org hosted two voter registration programs for the 2017-2018 academic year in the New Student Engagement Center. Roughly 185 students participated in the awareness activities. Plans will begin during the summer of 2018 to educate the campus community on local, regional, and national elections for the Fall of 2018.



Alternative Spring Break

The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability assists and supports Mission & Ministry's Alternative Spring Break activities that take place in the local community. This year's activity was supporting a local family with landscaping and painting. Approximately 115 students participated in this year's event and assisted with providing roughly 690 hours of service to the community.

DiversiTEA

The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability in collaboration with the Office of Student Engagement assisted with the development of a renewed tradition of "Tea Time/Collation" at UIW. The daily tradition of "Collation" of the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word, dates as far back as 1867 even before the establishment of the Incarnate Word College in 1886. The Sisters would gather for a break each afternoon when they returned to the convent from teaching in the local schools and helping in the hospitals. The Sisters would reflect and spend time with each other over tea and bread or cookies. 1,112 students, faculty and community members participated in this year's celebration of tea and cultures from around the world that included Egypt, China, Pakistan, Ireland, Uganda, Finland, Bahrain and Peru to name a few.

Cardinal Camp

Cardinal Camp is a two-day extended orientation program conducted by the Office of Student Engagement that welcomes UIW students to the campus community by educating them on the various programs, services, and traditions of the institution. Participants also have the opportunity to meet fellow students and learn about life at UIW. In August of 2017, 166 students participating in Cardinal Camp conducted 332 hours of community service by writing over 995 postcards to veterans and children ill at local hospitals as part of the Center's effort of indoctrinating students of the institution's mission of service.

Cardinal Move In

In an effort to assist new and returning students to the campus in the Fall of each year, the university hosts "UIW Move-In." This event held on August 24-25, 2017, encourages student volunteers to support and assist parents and students in unloading and gathering belongings to "move in" to their residence halls in preparation of a new academic school year. The Ettling Center in collaboration with Residence Life was able to assist with the volunteer services of 74 students totaling 296 hours of service.

Light the Way

Each Fall the University of the Incarnate Word opens the campus to the San Antonio community to celebrate the Holiday Season. Guests enjoy musical performances and await the annual lighting of the campus as part of the Official *UIW Light the Way* event held the weekend of Thanksgiving. The Ettling Center has played a key role over the past three years in assisting with "the call for volunteers" for prep days and for the actual day of the event. This year, 286 students volunteered to assist with this campus-wide event and provided 858 hours of community service.

Peace & Social Justice

Concepts of peace and social justice are central in The Bible and a central value of UIW and the Ettling Center. From their very first days, the founders of the university, the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word, have promoted the human dignity of all people. The ideas and concepts of peace as the fruit of justice that began as a "Peace Fair" in 1986, have expanded into many educational, prayerful, and celebrative events throughout the whole month of October with special emphasis on the last Wednesday of October near the anniversary of Dr. O'Halloran's death, a significant friend and partner of the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word (CCVI's). This year the ECCLS supported and assisted with over 15 programs conducted on and off the university campus reaching over 550 participants.



Cultural Awareness

UIW aims to educate men and women who will become concerned and enlightened citizens within the global community. Thus, the Office of Student Life, Residence Life, and Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability conduct various programs, activities, discussions, and services to promote Native American, Hispanic Heritage, International, and Black History Awareness. Roughly 855 students attended the numerous programs, activities, and events celebrating these cultures and customs within our community.


Education Awareness

UIW aims to educate men and women who have an understanding of the community and population for whom they serve and assist. The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability assisted, supported, and sponsored activities and events to highlight Diwali, the Festival of Colors, and Women's Month. Roughly 820 students attended the numerous programs and events celebrating these and other educational awareness activities on the UIW campus.

Social Awareness

The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability is a proponent of student development in formal and informal environments. Thus, the Center assisted with hosting numerous programs throughout the academic year such as Earth Week, Fall Tailgate, Soccer Night, Leadership Lecture, Cardinal Community Potluck, and the Associate Provost Student Luncheons. The purpose of these type of informal/social events is to encourage networking, open discussion, and development of "soft/essential" skills, which are crucial in today's professional work environment. Approximately 115 students participated in this year's social events within our community.





Internship Programs

In an effort to academically, personally, and professionally prepare undergraduate, graduate, and professional students for numerous outstanding internship programs such as HACU, WISH DC, and the Incarnate Word Foundation, the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability assists in the facilitation and application preparation of these internship opportunities.

University of Chicago HSI/HBCU Bridge Scholarship Program

The University of Chicago's Graham School offers merit-based, full tuition Bridge Scholarships for graduates of select Hispanic-Serving Institutions (HSIs) and Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) to study for three quarters at the University of Chicago as graduate students. ECCLS has assisted and supported two students to be part of this program for the past two years.

HACU DC Internship Program

The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability assists and supports undergraduate students in applying in the HACU Internship Program. The semester-long internship opportunity which includes a weekly seminar with field experts and policy practitioners is mainly set for participation in Washington DC during the Fall, Spring or Summer semesters. Since reinstituting this program in the Fall of 2017, six students have completed the application process with 1 receiving an internship in the Spring of 2018.


WISH DC Internship Program

The University of the Incarnate Word's Washington in Student Housing Internship (WISH) program, which is coordinated by the Ettling Center, assists and supports undergraduate students in applying and participating in a 32 hour/ work-week semesterlong internship opportunity which includes a weekly seminar with experts and policy practitioners. One UIW undergraduate student participated in the WISH DC program in the summer of 2017.

Incarnate Word Foundation (IWF) Internship Program

The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability in collaboration with the College of Humanities and Social Sciences (CHASS) has selected 1 recent UIW graduate to be the inaugural participant in this six week summer internship program with the Incarnate Word Foundation in St. Louis, Missouri. The student will work with two other students from the University of Monterrey Tech to develop and support program efforts of the Sisters in the local St. Louis community.

Alejandra Escobar-Cohort 4 Major: Psychology What's Next?


Alejandra Escobar

Hannah Albrightson-Cohort 4 Major: Philosophy/Psychology What's Next?


Hannah Albrightson graduated in May 2018 with a Bachelor's in Philosophy/Psychology.

She received the Philo-Sophia award, an award from the philosophy department for excellence in philosophy. Hannah will begin working full-time in the fall as an assistant preschool teacher.











Community Partnerships Summary

UIW Day of Service

The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability was asked to support and assist with President Evans' Inauguration Week of Activities which included "the Word in Action" day of service. The Center coordinated "on campus" activities while Mission and Ministry assisted with "off campus "programming. Roughly 165 students, faculty, and staff assisted with the day of service activities, which resulted in approximately 660 hours of community service.

Cardinal Latina Mentoring Program (CLMP)


The Latina Leadership Institute (LLI) formed by the San Antonio Hispanic Chamber of Commerce (SAHCC) and the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability (ECCLS) in the Fall of 2015 developed a mentoring program between Latina leaders within the community and UIW undergraduates. The purpose of the Cardinal Latina Mentoring Program (CLMP) is to enhance the persistence, retention and graduation rates of Latina UIW undergraduate students in partnership with a committed and dedicated Latina professional. The White House Initiative on Educational Excellence for Hispanics recognized this program as part of its national call for Commitments to Action in honor of its 25th anniversary. Of the 25 Cardinal Latina students that have participated in the program 20 have graduated.

Naturalization Ceremonies

The Ettling Center hosted the staff of United States District Judge Xavier Rodriguez at the UIW Sky Room on August 15, 2017 for the Naturalization of over 290 new Americans and a total of over 750 guests. Those being naturalized represented over 50 countries and were congratulated by UIW President Dr. Thomas Evans during his keynote address. The Center hosted 195 new citizens and a total of 465 guests at the April Naturalization Ceremony. Plans have begun to host a similar event in Spring of 2019.

Meet the Mission

The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability assisted and supported the 2017 Meet the Mission project sponsored by UIW Faculty in collaboration with Mission & Ministry. With the assistance of the CardinalsSync Software System, the Ettling Center was able to ascertain valuable data from the various projects conducted by the over 225 participants in the event comprising over 1,575 hours of community service collectively.



DreamWeek Community Forum

Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity Inc. in coordination with the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability hosted the Inaugural DreamWeek Community Forum to commemorate San Antonio's DreamWeek honoring the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. The event which took place in the Student Engagement Center in January of 2018 focused on the question: Did Integration Ruin America? The event provided 3 UIW faculty to be guest facilitators and have breakout sessions for the approximate 98 participants to discuss integration within the workplace, residential neighborhoods, and judicial system.

Natural Disaster Relief

The University demonstrated its continued commitment to **Mission** and walked in the footsteps of the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word by supporting relief efforts to those most in need that were impacted by the natural disasters in Fall 2017, which included Hurricanes Harvey, Irma & Maria and the earthquakes in Mexico. At the request of President Evans, the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability, Mission & Ministry, and Campus Engagement played lead roles in working with numerous campus partners to provide support and assistance to the San Antonio Food Bank, Catholic Charities, the American Red Cross and the South Texas Blood & Tissue Center. Items donated included clothing, diapers, water, and cleaning supplies. As a result over 120 students, faculty, and staff provided disaster relief in numerous ways including donating items and providing assistance in gathering/distributing items totaling over 480 hours of service. Additionally, Over \$1,500 was gathered in money to help with relief efforts.

Golden Harvest-Food Drive


The University of the Incarnate Word was founded by three French sisters of the Charity of the Incarnate Word. Their focus and mission was to care for those less fortunate, in need of assistance and provide charity. It is with this framework that UIW's Student Government Association created and established Golden Harvest. Since 2012, UIW has conducted this annual fall (November) campaign to gather canned goods to help the Greater San Antonio area. As a result of this campus community effort, the university has collected over six tons of canned food to help those in need. The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability, Health/ Wellness, and Student Engagement worked together to collect 5365.9 pounds of food to ensure residents of our community serviced by St. Vincent De Paul had nutritional items for the 2017 Thanksgiving season.

Golden Harvest-5K

UIW's Ettling Center, Dimensions of Wellness, Student Government Association in collaboration with St. Vincent De Paul has hosted a 5K in alignment with the Golden Harvest Annual service event for the past two years. The purpose of this event is to promote health & wellness, encourage the local community to become engaged in one of UIW's philanthropies and to support a local charity. This year's event had 196 participants which provided roughly \$1,000 in support to St. Vincent De Paul initiatives.

Calvary of Hope

UIW's School of Business Professor Dr. Tracie Edmonds' non-profit Calvary of Hope has partnered with the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability over the past three years to engage university students with local non-profits in an effort to offer student experiential learning opportunities while addressing needs of the community. Activities for the 2017-2018 academic year included a Holiday Cardinal Race (adapted from the Amazing Race concept), Santa's Workshop, and Games of Hope. These innovative and creative student led activities have impacted over 1,200 local students and 25 single families.



Leukemia & Lymphoma Society's-Light the Night

The San Antonio Area Leukemia & Lymphoma Society has partnered with UIW for the past three years in an effort to bring awareness and raise funds to support cancer research. Since 2015, the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability has led the university's effort, raising over \$12,000 in the past three years. Involvement and participation continues to increase each and every year with a small contingency of students, faculty, and staff personally participating in San Antonio's *Annual Light the Night* walk event held each October.

Community Engagement Initiative

The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability has established strong relationships with numerous non-profit, religious, and governmental partners. In an effort to continue to ensure reciprocal benefits for our partners and the institution, the Center has hosted a community service fair and hosts an annual community appreciation luncheon. As a result, the Center has formalized with 44 organizations over the past three years.


UIW 300 Tricentennial Celebration- "Mi Casa Es Su Casa"

The City of San Antonio celebrated its 300th year anniversary in 2018. The University of the Incarnate Word hosted the "Mi Casa Es Su Casa" to highlight and showcase the various ministries of the institution and their impact on the development and growth of San Antonio during its 300 years of existence. Approximately 750 people visited the UIW main campus on Sunday, April 15th to celebrate the city's Tri-centennial as part of the "Mi Casa Es Su Casa" community day. The day's activities included performances from numerous native folkloric dancers, schools, ethnic groups, story tellers and choral singers. Tours of the campus, the university's gardens, the Brackenridge Villa and the chapel of the Incarnate Word were also conducted. The Center helped coordinate 92 volunteers to assist and support the day's events providing approximately 414 hours of service.

Tricentennial-Cherishing Creation

UIW was accepted as a City of San Antonio Tricentennial Partner in the "Serve 300 SA" area and is in the middle of "Serving in Sustainability Projects, Cultivating Compassionate Care for All of Creation," a project of 300 hours of service and learning. In the 1890's, the Sisters sacrificed to buy the Headwaters property believing that nature is spiritually renewing and educationally beneficial. In August of 2018, UIW will host teachers and other local educators in an effort to share basic information and skills for starting school community gardens. We are "growing a legacy of service" with many branches of community gardening, pollination gardens, rooting out invasive species and nurturing native plants, documenting trees, conducting on-going sustainability research, and working with local partners to ensure that we meet the ecological needs in ways that protect and restore the natural environment. The San Antonio Express-News, Today's Catholic newspaper and Global Sisters Report have had articles featuring the efforts and initiatives of UIW and the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability.

Health Academy Initiative

The Ettling Center in collaboration with the Dean of the School of Physical Therapy with the guidance of the Provost is in support of the development and implementation of a health academy that will support the academic, community, and professional needs of the area served by the south/southwest side of San Antonio. Planning and discussions will continue throughout the 2018-2020 academic years which will include visits to other health professional campuses in Texas and the Nation to ensure the successful implementation of a unique model of excellence for the community.

College & Career Expo

The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability has hosted two College & Career Exploration days for middle school students over the past two years. Roughly 2,100 eighth grade students have participated in this one-day career informational program held on the UIW Main Campus for Southwest ISD middle school campuses. The 2018-2019 academic year College & Career Exploration Day is scheduled for October 19, 2018.

School Vaccinations

UIW's School of Osteopathic Medicine, Feik School of Pharmacy, and Miller School of Nursing & Health Professions in coordination with the Ettling Center conducted health immunizations for students in Southside, Southwest, San Antonio, Edgewood, and South San Antonio ISD's. This collaborative initiative in association with The University Health System provided 1,087 students with 2,219 doses of immunizations during the 2017-2018 academic year.

K-12 Eye Examinations

UIW's Rosenberg School of Optometry in coordination with the Ettling Center began a pilot program of providing full eye examinations in the Spring of 2018 for Southwest ISD elementary students. Of the 119 participating students, 107 were diagnosed with "abnormal eye examination" which required 104 students to need corrective eye glasses, 3 others will require additional corrective eye support. As a result of this collaboration, socio-economic status of the participating students, 104 students needing glasses, received a free pair due to the support of the Essilor Vision Foundation.

STEM Summer Camps

Over 60 Southwest ISD, San Antonio ISD, and St. Anthony Catholic Middle School students (boys & girls) participated in UIW's Math, Science & Engineering Mini-GEMS & Mini-SEMIs summer camps in collaboration with the Ettling Center during the 2017-2018 academic year. During the math and science summer camps, students were able to design underwater robots, conduct scientific lab experiments, work on drones and Autonomous Vehicle Systems (AVS).

Health/Wellness Initiative

UIW's Community Health Education & Kinesiology's Principle of Health students in association with the Ettling Center conducted health/wellness presentations for elementary students on the importance of "Health & Wellness". Over 1,100 Southwest ISD students benefited from these health/wellness presentations conducted by UIW students. An extension of this effort between the School of Nursing, the Dreeben School of Education, and Southwest ISD included the development of a leadership academy for 350 SWISD middle school student athletes which highlighted leadership skills, communication tools, time management, and anti-bullying discussions.

Health Professions Summer Camp

UIW's Health Professional Schools (Feik School of Pharmacy, Rosenberg School of Optometry, Miller School of Nursing & Health Professions, School of Osteopathic Medicine & School of Physical Therapy) hosted **31** Southwest ISD high school students as part of a Health Professions Summer Camp in July of 2017. The focus of the camp was to educate students on the various opportunities, academic requirements and criteria in applying, persisting and graduating from a health profession program. The 2018 Health Professions Summer Camp will take place the week of July 10-13, 2018 and plans to serve 35 students.

Cardinal Community Leader-Southwest ISD Service Initiative

The Center's Cardinal Community Leader Program assisted and supported the inaugural Anti-Bullying District Rally for Southwest ISD in the Spring of 2017 which attracted over 500 students and community members. As a result, the Cardinal Community Leaders as part of their service commitment to the community for the 2017-2018 academic year took on a larger role in supporting the needs of SWISD by focusing on the following service initiatives of the district: Clothing Closet, Endorsement Pathways, Adult Education/After-School Tutoring Program, Community 5K and their continued work with the Anti-Bullying initiative. As a result over 9,000 members of the Southwest ISD community benefitted from the services and activities of the CCL's via their work in donating over 600 pieces of clothing, conducting over 120 hours of after-school tutoring, assisting with over 600 members of the community participating in the community 5k and over 7,000 students engaged in the year-long anti-bullying program.

Outreach Initiative


The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability staff assists with numerous non-academic activities that support K-12 students to learn of the institution's openness of all students from all ages, backgrounds and grade levels. These type of events include Hallow-een "trick-o-treating", Easter Egg Hunt and Christmas events. The Center assists and supports many of these activities for our local schools and schools districts. This year, roughly 126 school age students participated in these type of events coordinated by the Ettling Center.

K-12 Academic Support

During the course of the academic year, the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability receives numerous requests to assist and support career & college fairs at the elementary or middle school level. Additionally, the Center receives requests for volunteers for numerous school events including judges for science, math, or other academic competitions. This year, the Center coordinated several faculty, staff, and students to provide academic support for these type of events. Approximately 3,450 students from various school campuses were impacted by the coordination of the Center's academic support efforts.

College Readiness

UIW's Office of Admissions conducts numerous activities throughout the year to promote the university and recruit prospective students to the university. The Ettling Center supports and assists in these activities via coordination of volunteer support, conducting a presentation on the Center, visiting with Parents, visiting with new students at New Student Orientations or at Open House events. The Center will continue to play a role to support the matriculation of undergraduate, graduate, and non-traditional students to the university.



Global Service Summary

Oaxaca Health Mission


UIW's Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability led the annual Health Mission to Oaxaca, Mexico in collaboration with Los Quijotes of San Antonio-Health Ambassadors September 1-8, 2017. The UIW Health Mission team consisted of a team of 22 students, staff and faculty to support the needs of annual Health Mission. UIW Health Professional Schools that participated in the 2017 Health Mission Trip included the Rosenberg School of Optometry, Feik School of Pharmacy and School of Physical Therapy. Over 2,000 patients were served and approximately 5,000 medical procedures were conducted to serve the indigenous population of Oaxaca. The week-long health mission was abruptly cut short due to an earthquake and subsequent aftershocks that occurred on Friday, September 8, 2017.

San Antonio/Regional Health Missions

In an effort to assist and support the health and wellness needs of the San Antonio and regional community, UIW's School of Osteopathic Medicine, Feik School of Pharmacy, and the Ila Faye Miller School of Nursing & Health Professions in collaboration with the Ettling Center has come together to provide various services to local school districts, community centers, and the homeless shelter Haven for Hope. As a result of this intra-professional collaboration roughly, 685 health professional students provided the community with approximately 2,397 hours of service.

ARISE Summer Mission

The University of the Incarnate Word's Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability led its 3rd annual summer camp for children served by the ARISE non-profit community based organization located in the Lower Rio Grande Valley of South Texas. Faculty, staff, and students from UIW conducted various activities to further enhance the personal and educational growth of the children who participated in the week-long summer program. Over 600 children attended the June 12-16, 2017 program which was supported by a UIW team of 33 members providing over 1,300 hours of community service.



ARISE Winter Health Mission

The University of the Incarnate Word's Rosenberg School of Optometry and the Ile Faye Miller School of Nursing and Health Professions in coordination with the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability conducted its 2nd Annual Arise Winter Health Mission in the Lower Rio Grande Valley (Pharr, Texas) December 18-20, 2017. The UIW Winter Health Mission Team was comprised of 50 members of the UIW community from the Ila Faye Miller School of Nursing & Health Professions, Rosenberg School of Optometry and the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability. As a result of the team's efforts, in collaboration with RAM (Remote Area Medical-non profit organization) staff conducted full eye examinations, health & wellness information sessions, blood glucose checks and medication history checks to 350 patients of the ARISE Colonia communities which estimated a financial impact of over \$90,570.

Chimbote, Peru

The Ettling Center, in collaboration with Women's Global Connection will coordinate a mission team to Chimbote, Peru in support of the 50 years of service by the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word in May of 2018. Participants in this year's mission trip will conduct academic and teaching support at the local school campuses serviced by the Sisters of Charity. Approximately 450 children will be assisted during this week-long mission via the support of an 8 member UIW Team planning to conduct at least 256 hours of service.


UIW Mexico Campus Exchange

In an effort to support and assist with campus engagement from the university's Mexico campuses (Mexico City & Irapuato), the Ettling Center has established strong relationships with the campus directors and staff to conduct service programming opportunities. The directors visit quarterly to discuss programs and opportunities for collaboration including an annual week-long service mission trip. Students from the UIW Irapuato campus have in the past participated and attended the ARISE Summer Mission Trip to the Lower Rio Grande Valley of South Texas. As part of the collaborative programming, UIW Irapuato students assist the initiative providing community service hours which benefit the "colonias" and children of the McAllen/Pharr area of South Texas.

UIW Legacy Service Travel Fund

The Ettling Center, with the financial support of the UIW Student Government Association Student Legacy Fund, awarded 18 students conducting service on international missions. Recipients of the Legacy Travel Fund provided service to local and indigenous populations in Peru, Costa Rica, Guatemala, and Mexico. Funds are maintained by the Ettling Center from the SGA Legacy Funds to ensure international service is conducted by students wanting to continue the mission of ministering to the sick and poor. \$9,000 of financial support was awarded to UIW students providing over 576 hours of service for the 2017-2018 academic year.





Sustainability Program Summary

Sustainability Scholars/Ambassadors


The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability in association with UIW's Student Government Association (SGA) in 2015 began the facilitation of the Sustainability Scholars Program. Scholars receive a semester scholarship to maintain, support, promote and bring awareness to UIW and the San Antonio community of the balance of human development and growth via various sustainable projects that ensure the welfare of the natural world, both in the present and for the future. Local efforts of the Sustainability Scholars have impacted over 2,000 local families as a result of collaborations with Southwest ISD, San Antonio ISD, and the Ella Austin Community Center. The initiative has received approval by SGA to proceed through 2019.

Cardinal Technology Recycle Program

The Cardinal Technology Recycling Program, which began in the Fall of 2016, is a collaboration between the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability and UIW's Technology Support Services. As a result of this relationship, members of our local community have benefitted from receiving 366 UIW recycled technology items (including laptops, desktops, and printers) to 21 educational and non-profit community based organizations in Central/South Texas. The estimated cost-savings of the donated technology equals to: \$134,530.00

Cardinal Move Out

In an effort to be ecologically conscientious as students "move out" of the residence halls and apartments on the UIW Broadway campus, the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability in association with Residence Life hosted the Inaugural Cardinal Move Out Initiative in Spring of 2018. Furniture, non-perishable food and clothing will be donated to St. Vincent De Paul. Additionally, Residence Life had "dorm furniture" that was donated to Hawthorne Academy and the Young Women's Leadership Academy. This effort and donations will assist at least 2,400 students and 1,200 residents of San Antonio.



Cardinal/Community Gardens

The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability with the assistance of the Sustainability Scholars and student volunteers, maintained the four Cardinal gardens and assisted with the enhancement and maintenance of community gardens located at Carroll Early Childhood Academy, Ella Austin Community Center, Guadalupe Community Center, and Haven for Hope. Over 648 hours of garden and landscaping activities were clocked for roughly 229 students who helped support this ecological initiative.

Sustainability Conferences

UIW hosted the prestigious College & University Recycling Coalition (CURC) workshop on October 15, 2017. Experts on campus sustainability from throughout the country attended the event, held in the SEC Ballroom, and took tours of the Solar House, grounds, and the adjoining Headwaters reserve. Over 250 participants attended the three-day conference which included presentations/sessions on the UIW Main Campus. The Office of Sustainability also hosted the Texas Climate Change Tour during October of 2017, which was attended by more than 15 participants to the discussion. Staff also participated at UTSA's Equinox Sustainability Conference/Festival which attracted over 200 students from the San Antonio area.

Basura Bash/Cardinal Beach Cleanup

The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability assisted and coordinated a fall and spring clean up activity on and off the university campus in an effort to engage and involve the campus community. The Fall Basura Bash had over 149 community, students, and faculty members participate providing 596 hours of service. Moreover, 40 students, faculty, and staff assisted with a clean-up effort on a beach outside of Port Aransas during the spring semester, which provided 160 hours of service to the area.

Sustainability/Garden Talks


The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability hosted numerous "Sustainability/Garden Talk" activities throughout the fall/spring academic semesters. These included a *Public Citizens* community discussion and several "garden talks" focusing on harvesting, composting, and health/wellness. Over 50 faculty, staff, and students attended the various programs and events focused on sustainability.

EcoExchangeEdu

UIW's Kevin Salfen, chair of the San Antonio EcoExchange organization, assisted with the 4th Annual Academic Showcase high-lighting campus projects, activities, and projects demonstrating sustainability initiatives. This year's event which was held on April 6, 2018 had presentations submitted by UIW's Sustainability Scholars. As a result, UIW's Sustainability Scholar, Giselle De Leon, won first place for her EcoExchangeEdu poster presentation related to the restoration of the Blue Hole located on the Headwaters Sanctuary.

HACU EcoAmerica Grant


The University of the Incarnate Word was recognized and received \$10,000 from HACU & EcoAmerica for its collaboration with community partners on the creation of ecological initiatives to support and assist the East and South sides of San Antonio. In addition to educating socioeconomically vulnerable neighborhoods throughout the south, east and west areas of San Antonio about organic urban farming, the university will also work with local school-aged children to better understand the importance of nutrition, health, and wellness. The award funds will be also used to support UIW Student Sustainability Scholars, a unique program which engages university students to help plan, implement, report and maintain community gardens in collaboration with San Antonio & Southwest ISD schools.


Faculty Engagement Summary

Carnegie Classification for Community Engagement

The Carnegie Foundation's Classification for Community Engagement is an elective classification, meaning that it is based on voluntary participation by institutions. The elective classification involves data collection and documentation of important aspects of institutional mission, identity and commitments and requires substantial effort invested by participating institutions. The Carnegie classification is not an award. It is an evidence-based documentation of institutional practice to be used in a process of self-assessment and quality improvement. The Ettling Center is playing a leading role in gathering campus and community partners to review and submit the application which is due April of 2019 for announcement of the recognition scheduled for January 2020.

CardinalsSync Co-Curricular Transcript

The Ettling Center continues its work on the development and implementation of a "pilot phase" of the Co-Curricular Transcript (CCT) with the Feik School of Pharmacy. Initial pilot phase began in Spring of 2017 with goal of expanding to the main campus by 2020. Serving as an online feature in OrgSync/CardinalsSync, the Co-Curricular transcript records student involvement in various areas such as extra-curricular activities, honors/recognitions, study abroad, community service and memberships. Students can self-record service involvement and completion upon verification by an event coordinator or the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability. In essence, the transcript serves as a means to accentuate the extracurricular/activity journey of a student and provides a holistic view of their skills and abilities beyond the academic classroom.



Service Learning Showcase

The Second Annual Faculty Service Learning Showcase was held for the first time in UIW Eleventh Annual Research Week which was called "A History of Mission Driven Scholarship," February 19, 2018. During this Tricentennial Year, the program tried to make visible through historical pictures that UIW service today is in continuity with Incarnate Word history since 1869. The showcase features faculty projects on best practices, theories, scholarship, and examples of service learning. During the day and evening, 24 people spoke on various aspects of service learning, funding, outcomes, projects, sustainability, and the development of empathy. The posters that been created by 31 people were not only exhibited on that day, but throughout UIW's Research Week.

Service Learning Committee

Dr. Martha Ann Kirk, CCVI, is serving as the faculty liaison for the Ettling Center and is coordinating efforts to increase the number of service learning courses offered at UIW. Service learning courses incorporate community service opportunities and guided reflection into the academic course content. 19 faculty members from departments across the university are serving on this committee that will provide recommendations to the Provost about establishing an official designation of service learning in the curriculum.

The Gathering


The Gathering is an annual forum for exploring best practices, challenges, opportunities, and resources for service-learning and civic engagement professionals from colleges and universities throughout the State of Texas. The higher education faculty and staff at this discussion-based forum explored ways to increase community awareness and involvement within the academic environment. This year's event was hosted in San Antonio and held on the Trinity & UIW campuses November 2-3, 2018. Roughly 49 faculty and staff from over 16 Texas college/university campuses attended the conference.

Reflection Analysis-CardinalsSync

The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability consulted Drs. Susan Hall and Sandra Guzman-Foster to conduct research on student reflections as part of the university's community service graduation requirement. 252 student reflections were analyzed for this research project. All reflections analyzed in this project were written by upper division students and submitted electronically via the CardinalsSync software system. This sampling represented 25% of the upper division reflections posted in the online system as of February 2018 for the 2017-2018 academic year. The researchers classified the entries using a schema inspired by the work of Mezirow and Brookfield. The most striking finding of the qualitative analysis was that the lowest level of reflection dominated the sample; 50% of the reflections in the sample were written at the descriptive level, even though these entries were written by upper division students. Another 45% were written at the analytical level and 5% were classified as critical. This kind of examination illustrates how reflections at the analytical and critical levels are much more consistent with UIW's goal for the service requirement: to "promote civically-engaged leaders collaborating in partnership with local and global community stakeholders to achieve individual/social transformation while respecting the dignity of each individual and all creation" (UIW Ettling Center, 2018).

Interfaith Innovation Grant

The Interfaith Youth Core awarded the Ettling Center an "Interfaith Innovation Grant" for the 2017-2018 academic year which was titled "Furthering Interfaith Literacy, Fluency, and Service Partnerships." Sister Martha Ann Kirk was the director of the grant assisted by Dr. Lopita Nath. Dr. Susan Hall also shared in relation to service learning. The grant served students and the general public providing information, programs, and helping to publicize programs of various groups. The grant program made the policy an opportunity for positive campus interfaith education for all. About 400 faculty learned of this affirmation of diversity on the UIW campus from the Provost the August Faculty Orientation.
