

Pirector's Note

The Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability has maintained programming, activities, and services, despite the overwhelming impact the COVID-19 virus has placed on our local, regional and international partners to serve those most in need. At the onset of the COVID pandemic, in March of 2020, it was anticipated that this would be an isolated event and that society's "return to normal" would take place after only a few weeks, maybe months of this disease impacting a few, but not many. As of June 2021, over 600,000 Americans have lost their lives to this deadly disease. Not only did this pandemic expose the health and medical disparities between socio-economic and ethnic/racial groups, but other social justice issues such as criminal justice reform, health care, gun violence, immigration, human trafficking, climate change, and voting rights were brought to the forefront.

The Center was able to provide innovative and creative programs, services, and activities to continue to support the needs of our local, regional, and global community. Moreover, some of the new programs and services offered as alternative options to mitigate the spread of COVID will continue beyond the 2020-2021 academic year such as the ARISE Health/Wellness Zoom informational sessions, Shoebox project, Juneteenth community event, and community blood drives.

Additionally, the Center was able to support, host, and sponsor various events and activities addressing diversity, equity, and inclusion on the UIW campus in response to issues of discrimination, racism, and social injustices which were brought to the forefront after the death of George Floyd in the summer of 2020.

Despite the many challenges, including working remotely and the cancellation of group programming and mission trips in South Texas and Mexico, as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability was able to offer students various innovative and alternative service options that have also met the needs of our global community.

The following is a summary report of the 150+ programs, activities, events, and efforts conducted by the students, faculty, staff, and friends of the Center to support the goals and objectives of the University of the Incarnate Word and impacting over 40,000 members of our global community during the 2020-2021 academic year. The Center will continue to serve and support those in need, poor, sick, voiceless, and hopeless in our global community throughout the 2020-2021 academic year despite continued challenges and obstacles that persist in our society.

Now & the Future

Since the inception of the Center in 2012, Sr. Dorothy "Dot" Ettling, wanted to ensure that the goals, objectives, and mission of developing engaged and enlightened citizens would grow by obtaining financial support from education, business, private, government, and religious organizations. Despite the challenges faced throughout 2020 & 2021, the Center leadership was focused in working with friends and partners of the Center in obtaining funds that would ensure the sustainability of programs and activities through 2023. The following is a listing of over \$550,000 in grant and private funds awarded to the Center during the 2020-2021 academic year.



H-E-B's Central Market made a generous donation of \$5,000 to support the Cardinals' Cubboard Food Pantry and those members of our community who are food insecure.



The Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word donated \$88,000 for Missionary Program work to continue at the Ettling Center in Mexico, Central & South America.



The Center received \$1,000 as part of the Interfaith Youth Core's: Racial Equity & Interfaith Cooperation Award to support interfaith & racial equity programming on the UIW Campus.



The Center received \$12,000 as part of the Hands of Service grant focusing on supporting student leaders who are socially committed and have the opportunity to develop professional leadership skills to enhance responsible, sustainable, and meaningful community action experiences.



The Center received \$20,000 to provide health/wellness and educational programs to children & communities of South Texas that have been traditionally underserved and underrepresented and do not have access to opportunities and experiences that they would otherwise not have the ability to receive.



-lealth & Wellness is another area of financial support received by the Center to assist those that are less fortunate and in need.



The Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word donated \$15,000 to continue the annual Girls Summit previously conducted by Women's Global Connection. The program focuses on empowering young women in today's global society.



The Hilton Foundation in association with the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word have awarded the Ettling Center \$361,000 to assist with an evaluation and service-learning project of a U.S./Mexico non-profit network supporting the needs of the underserved and poor.

GOAL ACHIEVED

1). Improve on "telling the story" of the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability

- The Center received local newspaper coverage for the work done on the South Texas Mask Initiative, the H-E-B grant award and the United Way Shoebox project.
- The Center expanded its website to include Social Justice, Diversity, Equity and Inclusion during the 2020-2021 academic year.

GOAL ACHIEVED

2). Consider expanding leadership opportunities provided by the Ettling Center beyond the Cardinal Community Leaders program.

- In an effort to support the needs of the campus community for the 2020-2021 academic year as a
 result of the COVID-19 pandemic, SWEET Ambassadors were established to allow peer-to-peer
 education and awareness opportunities of the campus policies and guidelines. Moreover, as a result of
 the outstanding work and response of the SWEET Ambassadors dedicated to this effort, they also
 assisted in hosting "voting registration drive" tables throughout the fall.
- The Ettling Center also provided a new "pilot program" opportunity for a Ettling Center student
 assistant to assist the Edwards Aquifer Authority as an intern throughout the Spring of 2021. This pilot
 program hopes to expand to offering a similar "internship" opportunity to at least 3 local non-profits for
 the '21-'22 academic year.
- Center graduate and undergraduate student staff were encouraged to play a larger role in the daily operations of the Cardinals' Cupboard Food Pantry (CCFP), beyond the "staffing" hours of operation. This included marketing and purchasing of food items and preparing for maintenance checks from the San Antonio Food Bank (SAFB)

GOAL ACHIEVED

3). Apply for at least 2-3 grants or funding opportunities, in the hopes of obtaining over \$30,000 in funding for programs and services conducted by the Center by 6/30/2021.

 During the 2020-2021 academic year, the Center Leadership Team submitted several grants and inquiries to obtain funding for programming, services, and activities to support the goals and objectives of the Center. Of the seven submissions, six solicitations were awarded for a total of over \$550,000.



GOAL ACHIEVED

- 4). Provide students with opportunities to "make meaningful experiences" during their service experiences at the University of the Incarnate Word including focusing on alternative/socially distant options.
 - As previously noted, the COVID-19 pandemic has altered and limited face-to-face and group
 interactions and programming throughout the 2020-2021 academic year; thus, alternative and socially
 distant options were implemented to provide opportunities for our campus community to continue to
 serve the needs of our local and global community. These options included: canned food drives,
 donations of diapers and children's books, shoebox project of personal hygiene products to be shared
 with local non-profits, and facial mask covering project.

GOAL ACHIEVED

- 5). Provide innovative and creative educational awareness programs and activities that address sustainable, ecological, and air quality in a safe COVID-19 environment.
 - · Assisted with the hosting of the annual sustainability/Earth month awareness program;
 - Assisted with the hosting and recognition of the 2020-2021 William Mulcahy Award for Ecological Stewardship to a university faculty and staff member;
 - As a result of COVID, various innovative and creative options were developed by students to complete
 their graduation service hour requirement while addressing sustainability issues such as planting a
 garden in their backyard, creating composting projects, establishing home recycling centers, and
 making xeriscaping plots in backyards to conserve water.




GOAL ACHIEVED

- 6). Facilitate and support programs and events that address diversity, equity, and inclusion for the campus and local community.
 - The Center helped coordinate, host, conduct, and implement over 10 DEI programs and activities
 focused on highlighting the various cultural, racial, inclusive, and diverse populations that exist on the
 UIW campus. These events included a discussion on the Death Penalty, Human Trafficking, Hispanic
 Heritage Awareness, Black History, Women's History, and a Juneteenth Celebration.

GOAL ACHIEVED

- 7). Equip and engage UIW faculty in service and service learning opportunities and experiences which will enhance the UIW classroom experience including contactless & socially distant options.
 - The COVID-19 pandemic created a "pause" in conducting various mission trips and service learning
 opportunities that could compromise the health of all participating stakeholders, although the Center
 was able to support faculty with guest speaker and other technological options.
- The Center began work on the implementation of the "experiential learning module" available on the GivePulse and Canvas platform systems. A pilot program will be implemented during the '21-'22 academic year to provide the UIW community with other technological options to support academic service learning.




2021-2022 Strategic Goals

- Begin "piloting" the experiential/service learning component of GivePulse to enhance the UIW academic service learning experience including contactless & socially distant options.
- Continue to assist and support programs and events that address diversity, equity, and inclusion for the campus and local community throughout the 2021-2022 academic year.



A call was sent out in early April from the United Way of San Antonio & Bexar County to support and assist our community, especially children, veterans, elderly, homeless, and vulnerable populations by filling up a shoebox with basic hygiene and personal care-items such as soap, shampoo, and toothpaste. Over 210 shoeboxes were garnered and donated by inspired UIW students. Shoeboxes were distributed to three local local non-profits including the United Way of San Antonio & Bexar County, St. Vincent De Paul Society of San Antonio and Child Advocates of San Antonio (CASA). The Center plans to continue this project for the 2021-2022 academic year as a result of the outstanding response by the UIW community.

- +The Center staff made accommodations to help with garnering and transporting the items to the 3 local agencies.
- +Amazing response by the UIW community.

REFLECTION

 This effort has allowed many UIW students to provide service to the community while being conscientious of the COVID protocols.

IMPACT

The Center plans to continue this project throughout the 2021-2022 academic year in the hopes of passing the number of shoeboxes received as of June 2021 of 210.

- --Consistent marketing campaign.
- --Due to COVID and the various technology issues in the colonias, it was difficult to anticipate the number of participants per session;
- +Presenters were able to conduct their sessions bilingually, which addressed the verbal needs of over 95% of the attendees:
- +Topics were selected based on the needs of the community, in an effort to ensure their health, wellness, and wellbeing during this unique time in our history.

REFLECTION

• The Center normally coordinates two mission trips to South Texas and ARISE to support the needs of the community; As a result of the COVID-19 virus, the Center decided to pause the trips but wanted to maintain and support the needs of the community via distance education; this effort surpassed our expectations.

IMPACT

The inaugural year of the program was extremely successful and we plan to continue this online/virtual awareness series throughout the 2021-2022 academic year.

CHALLENGES & HIGHLIGHTS

- ---Marketing and reminding the campus community of this alternative option of service during the COVID-19 pandemic.
- ---Encouraging students to give a more in-depth description of the impact this activity has had in their personal lives and local community.
- +Initial goal of having 30 submissions has been surpassed with over 180 projects being submitted.
- +Projects received have allowed UIW students from beyond San Antonio to participate, including students representing over 13 Texas counties.

REFLECTION

- A large number of student reflection responses noted how this opportunity allowed them to spend time with family and worked as a stress release therapeutic.
- Some students noted their interest to investigate other sustainable projects and/ or activities beyond gardening.

IMPACT

Increased awareness of nature, service, and sustainable efforts for the South Texas community and beyond.
Submissions were also received from several parts of Mexico.
