- Provide students with opportunities to "make meaningful experiences" as part of their graduation service requirement with an emphasis on poverty, food insecurity, homelessness, and immigration.


 Achieved

Social Justice Highlight South Texas Vaccinations Initiative



COVID-19 impacted so many communities throughout the nation and the world, including various parts of the South Texas community. One such area was the San Juan De Los Lagos Catholic parish located on the Westside of San Antonio. In late Fall of 2021, an outbreak hit the community which resulted in so many becoming ill, losing time from work, hospitalization and losing their lives. During the month of October, over 18 funerals were performed that were a direct result of the COVID-19 pandemic. In an effort to support the needs of the community the Ettling Center in association with the UIW schools of Nursing and Pharmacy hosted a one-day COVID 19 vaccination clinic to mitigate the flow of the virus.

CHALLENGES

- The event was planned over a three week time frame, so marketing and distibution of information was a challenge.
- Dispelling myths in a heavily Latino community regarding the COVID 19 vaccinations and the actual sideeffects.

HIGHLIGHTS

- In visiting with the local priest of the congregation, he anticipated about 30-40 residents to attend the clinic. Over 135 attended the event.
- Over 10% of those who attended the clinic were able to obtain their booster shot, including some young school aged children.

REFLECTION

 Many of the residents were at first hesitant to walk in thinking that they would have to pay or not sure of the side effects. This program highlighted to our students and faculty of the health disparity that continues to exist in many parts of our state, especially in areas with large percentages of people of color.

IMPACT

• Drammatically reduced the number of deaths in the community in the subsequent months; additionally, the clinic helped reduce the myths and fears of the vaccine and booster shots.

Leadership Highlight UIN Health Professions Summer Camp

The one-day enrichment camp is focused on enlightening high school students on the various health careers and the opportunities available in the health, wellness, & nutrition fields in collaboration with each of UIW's Health Professional Schools, the UIW School of Math, Science, & Engineering, the Office of the VP of Enrollment Management and the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability. The Health Professions Summer Camp is part of the Ettling Center's College Health Scholars Initiative.

CHALLENGES

- Planning for the number of student participants due to the timing of the event which may conflict with other summer programs and activities for high school students.
- Coordination with the school districts due to their summer hours and schedule.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Overall number of actual participants of 137 exceeded the goal of 115 attendeees.
- Happily suprised by the diversity and representing high schools of the 137 participants.

REFLECTION

 Many of the participants noted in the program survey that they had not considered as a possible career path the following health programs of Optometry, Physical Therapy or Pharmacy prior to attending the one day program. This event had changed their thought process.

IMPACT

 The impact of those in attendance will not be seen for five to nine years from now, but via anecdotal and qualitative data obtained throughout the day, students truly learned and gained from this educational program.

Global Missions

Since 2015, the Ettling Center for Civic Leadership & Sustainability has led the University in coordinating and facilitiating global health and education missions to various parts of the world including the Greater San Antonio area and South Texas. At the end of this reporting period, the Center was given the "green light" to continue to provide health and education mission opportunities and experiences to our UIW faculty, students, and staff. The Center looks forward to a more robust program offering during the 2022-2023 academic year.

Unfortunately the COVID-19 pandemic has impacted the Center's ability to facilitate and conduct global mission trips over the past two years. In late Spring of 2022, the Center in collaboration with UIW's Feik School of Pharmacy was given the "green light" to move forward to provide our UIW students, faculty, and staff with an educational global experience while providing a service to those in need in Las Piedras, Puerto Rico. A UIW team of sixteen, including thirteen students, traveled in May of 2022 to provide elderly residents of a senior citizens center with basic health, wellness, and pharmaceutical support to impove their daily lives.

CHALLENGES

- The COVID-19 pandemic created various logistical issues as the health protocols to and from PR changed during the planning period;
- The lack of a strong technological infrastructure in PR outlined several challenges.

HIGHLIGHTS

- The Senior Citizen home supported by this particular health mission was very appreciative of the work conducted.
- University of Puerto Rico School of Pharmacy invited our UIW PR FSOP team to present and attend a group discussion regarding future collaborations.

REFLECTION

 Many residents and members of the community who were served during this unique opportunity in May of 2022, were impacted by Hurrican lan's devestation in September of 2022. The Center and team members are contacting the "island" to see what support might be provided.

IMPACT

Team members left the health mission feeling as support and assistance was provided, although the recent impact of Hurrican lan refocuses and recenters us to remember how important relationships, time, and assistance can may a difference.

Over the past two years we have had to work through obstacles, challenges, and problems, because this is who We are and What we do--- care for the Lord's flock.

Many of our brothers and sisters

were losing hope, losing faith, hungry, afraid, sheltered, sick, poor, unemployed, homeless, and not sure of the future.

But with the Lord's blessings, support, and assistance, we have been able to to do the Lord's work during this unique time in our history here on Earth.
